Governor's "Smart Energy Usage" Campaign Reduces Energy Costs for State

In response to the Governor's *Smart Energy Usage* campaign this past summer, state agencies reduced their energy costs by five percent. The data for July and August 2001 for six key agencies demonstrated savings of over \$130,000. The Energy Office provided training workshops and technical assistance to state, university, and community college facility managers. Significant energy dollar savings were achieved by turning off lights, computers, office equipment, and by raising thermostats by two degrees or more. Joint Partnership Benefits Low-Income Residents

Arizona's largest multi-family low-income home weatherization project was kicked off February 21, 2002, in Avondale. The project will save energy and provide added comfort and safety for 50 low-income, older adult households in the Vianney Villas, Section 8, Housing Complex. The U.S. Department of Energy Low-Income Weatherization Assistance Program was initiated in 1977. The Maricopa County Human Services Department administers the low-income home weatherization program for county residents; and the Foundation for Senior Living (FSAL), a non-profit Catholic charities agency, subcontracts with Maricopa County to actually perform the weatherization work on low-income homes.

The project at Vianney Villas was selected because the potential for energy savings was high. Heating and cooling units were old and inefficient, and the units needed new insulation, duct sealing, and other weatherization repairs. Generous financial support from Southwest Gas and Arizona Public Service has been combined with annual federal dollars provided by the Energy Office to ensure sufficient funding and a successful program. The City of Avondale also partnered in this project by waiving permit fees that allowed the weatherization of additional low-income housing units.

Weatherization improvements will include the replacement of gas-pack heating and cooling equipment, the addition of more efficient insulation, and duct sealing work. As a result of this project, estimated energy savings will exceed \$193 per unit per year.

Municipal Energy Management Program Grants Awarded

The Municipal Energy Management Program (MEMP) is designed to encourage and assist in the development and implementation of energy management programs. It helps facilitate the planning process and provides the necessary basic tools, staff training, and technical assistance for energy conservation through a simple and direct step-by-step approach. The first step is understanding where energy is being consumed and how much it costs, based on utility bill analysis and audits. The second step identifies strategies for lowering the energy bill. The third step assists in incorporating energy management into future development through an energy management plan.

As part of MEMP, the Energy Office has made funds available for energy-saving projects for which all incorporated Arizona cities, towns, counties, improvement districts, and Indian tribes with populations under 70,000 are eligible to apply. The Energy Office recently awarded grants totaling \$40,000 to the Towns of Fredonia and Camp Verde, and to the Cities of Yuma and Avondale. Grant projects include conversion of mercury vapor streetlights to energy-efficient high-pressure sodium lights, retrofitting traffic signals with light emitting diode (LED) lamps, and replacement of fixtures and lamps to reduce energy costs and improve lighting quality. Habitat for Humanity Project Implements Energy Saving Ideas

The Energy Office got involved with Habitat for Humanity by helping determine the reason for higher utility bills found on some new homes in the Phoenix Chapter project at 16th Street and Southern. An extensive energy audit conducted with the assistance of local residents, produced several recommendations for saving energy and improving the comfort levels in new homes. The energy-saving ideas included duct sealing and separate duct systems for evaporative cooler and air conditioning systems. The Energy Office also worked with the subcontractors to improve installation of air conditioning equipment and insulation. Through the Energy Office involvement, Habitat for Humanity has now adopted all the energy-saving recommendations and is a participant in the EPA Energy Star Program.
